We hold the mystery in our hearts and give thanks for renewal and togetherness, for all that is fresh and good and loving in our lives.

We hold in our hearts those for whom this is a time of sadness Our hearts go out to all who have lost loved ones; the lonely, the homeless, the bereaved. **Despite the pain, may hope be born in them again**.

We give thanks for the angels who sing to us the families who nurture us the stars that guide us wise ones, shepherds and kaumatua who show us the way.

We give thanks that we can put down our cares our gifts and responsibilities, our tributes and concern, and for this moment we're engulfed in love: Love born in us this day. **We sing as a prayer** CH4 721 We lay our broken world v. 1,3,4,5,6 Tune Veni Spiritus CH4 596

#### **Advent Communion service**

By the grace of God we are all invited to share in this act of communion. This is the Lord's table. All are welcome here. You are welcome here.

Emmanuel. God is with us.

We share the peace of God with those seated close to us.

We come here to do what Jesus told his disciples to do : we remember, we thank God and we are enabled to go on in the power of God's Holy Spirit. In the symbolic imagery of spiritual food we receive encouragement, strength and assurance through the grace of God. Let us affirm our faith together: In faith, Joseph took comfort from a dream, Embracing complex, reconstituted, Extended family relationships. **This faith might reshape our preconceptions, Birthing new ways of being whanau.** Faith is relationship and way of life, **Caring for the vulnerable, Casting out demons of self-doubt and despair.** This is our faith, **Living with uncertainty yet acting with confidence,** Walking with the Spirit of God to the heart of everything: **God in us, now – and here.** 

We praise the God who is known to us in the breaking of bread, the God who shares our suffering and our joy.

We are surrounded by God's love and by a great cloud of witnesses to God's love. We give thanks for people of the past and present whose selfless acts of love continue to inspire us. We thank God for all those who have had influence on our lives and taught us through word and example how to be followers of Jesus.

We are part of that great communion of saints.

Let us pray together a version of the prayer that Jesus taught his followers:

Loving God in whom is heaven:

The hallowing of your name echo throughout the universe The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the earth Your heavenly will be done by all created beings Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth.

With the bread we need for today, feed us. In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us. In times of temptation and testing, strengthen us. From trials too great to endure, spare us. From the grip of all that is evil, free us. For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, Now and forever. Amen

We continue in prayer: Gracious God, it was as a baby that you came to us, a child in a manger – smiling and crying, staring out in wonder and sleeping in contentment. As we celebrate this birth once again, May we too be filled with wonder and contentment. In a world of chaos and busy–ness, calm our hearts and minds to this sacred moment.

We thank you for the example of Mary, a frightened teenage mother who dared to say yes to you. We thank you for Joseph, a confused father who learned to trust in your mysterious and wonderful ways.

We thank you for Jesus, child, youth and adult – who helps us understand that you are always in this world with us, and who offers hope at times when we feel lonely or lost.

As we look forward to the celebration of the birth of Jesus, so we commemorate his time among us.

We remember how, on the night he was betrayed, Jesus sat at supper with his disciples and said 'remember me'.

So as Christ did we ask you to bless these symbols of life, these gifts of your grace and we share them.

In so doing we remember that you are with us always.

#### Loving God, may we experience through your life in us The strength we need and the love you want us to share.

Gracious God, come to us in the broken bread – nourish us. In the sharing of the cup be our joy and our courage for life ahead. May we be fed by your love and set free by your power and may we go from this place refreshed and renewed by your spirit. In the name of Jesus we pray. Amen.

Even when the world rejected Jesus, on the very night that he was betrayed, he continued to care for others and to feed them. This was God's love in action.

Jesus invited all to eat with him, especially those who felt rejected and alone. Jesus invites us to eat with him now.

Jesus sat with his friends and shared a simple meal.

Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke the bread and shared it with his friends as a symbol of his life so generously given for all the world.

He said "take, eat - and remember me".

In the same way Jesus took the cup. A body was broken, a life poured out with the living hope of life, healing, justice and peace for all. This cup is the symbol of the new covenant between you and God.

Jesus said: Whenever you drink it, remember me.

We take these symbols of bread and the cup and do what Jesus asked of his followers. We remember Jesus. We are in communion with God and each other.

We who are many are one body for we all share the one bread. These are the gifts of God for the people of God. May we who share these gifts be in Christ and Christ in us.

Please eat the bread when you receive it for we each need to accept our own responsibility for our relationship with God but please hold the cup so that we may drink together as a symbol of our unity in Christ.

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We are all one in Christ Jesus. Come let us drink together.
